“The goal of this FOA is to fund intermediary organizations that will provide Capacity Building Assistance (CBA) to at least 3 youth-serving organizations to replicate evidence-based TPP programs in a defined service area with demonstrated need. CBA is designed to enhance the ability of organizations to implement, evaluate, and sustain evidence-based TPP programs. CBA can focus on building an organization’s capacity to develop and manage a TPP program (i.e., organizational CBA) as well as building an organization’s capacity to implement an evidence-based TPP program (i.e., programmatic CBA). CBA can encompass diverse strategies and approaches, including but not limited to, training, technical assistance, coaching, mentoring, and peer-to-peer support.”

The specific objectives of the TPP Early Innovation Program are to:

1. Establish two independent intermediaries (one focused on technology interventions and one focused on program interventions) to select, fund, and support a portfolio of innovators across the country to advance adolescent health and prevent teen pregnancy.
2. Develop numerous innovative products, programs, or processes (herein referred to as interventions) that are prototyped, tested, refined, and well designed to prevent teen pregnancy and advance adolescent health.
3. Develop and implement a monitoring and evaluation plan appropriate for early stage innovation, inclusive of performance measures.
4. Communicate and disseminate successes, lessons learned, and knowledge gained to contribute to the literature on teen pregnancy prevention.

To be eligible for funding, applicant must propose implementing strategies and activities in a state that has teen birth rates higher than the 2013 national average (26.6 births per 1,000 female adolescents ages 15-19). In addition, proposed health centers and youth-serving systems should be in an area (county, city) with high teen birth rates (>26.6 births per 1,000 female adolescents ages 15-19). Applicant must demonstrate the ability to assemble a network of publicly funded health centers that serve vulnerable youth, such as federally qualified

health centers (FQHC), health departments, Title X clinics, and/or community health centers. MOUs from proposed health centers must be included in application submission. See Strategies and Activities for information that must be included in an MOU. Applicant must also demonstrate commitment from youth-serving systems through an MOU. MOU should indicate agreement of youth-serving system to participate in the strategies and activities required for this project and to allocate staff time to this project. See Strategies and Activities for information that must be included in an MOU. Proposed health centers and youth-serving systems should be geographically located to facilitate successful referral and linkage relationships. Applicant must demonstrate how health centers and youth-serving systems are appropriate selections for this initiative.

The purpose of the CAE Program is to provide funding for additional tools to address the rates of teen pregnancy among adolescent youth who are at greatest risk of STD/STI and most likely to bear children out of wedlock. Program plans will focus on the social, psychological, and health gains to be realized by delaying initiation of sexual activity and engaging in healthy relationships. Grantees under this program will be expected to develop a targeted and medically accurate approach to reducing teen pregnancies through abstinence education. Abstinence education programming is one intervention in a continuum of services that seeks to prevent teen pregnancy.
